

Everybody's Talking!

ATM alchemy: What if the local ATM bought gold, instead of dispensing cash? Such a device is turning heads in Shanghai, China. Customers drop in old jewelry or coins, and the machine uses heat and sensors to analyze, melt, and evaluate each item. After it confirms the gold's quality, a direct deposit goes to the user's account, based on up-to-the-minute market rates. The process requires no forms and only accepts items above a certain weight and purity. The idea quickly gained attention, with crowds lining up and appointment slots filling fast. Some online viewers have raised questions about safety and accuracy, but others see it as a modern answer to old-fashioned pawning. For now, it's drawing plenty of interest, and plenty of gold.

Stride ride: Walking got a rethink when a Dutch designer wondered what would happen if treadmills hit the street. Built like a bicycle but powered differently, this ride replaces the usual pedals with a moving treadmill belt, letting people walk in place while cruising ahead with help from an electric motor. The contraption, called a Lopifit, can roll faster than a casual stroll but doesn't leave riders out of breath or drenched in sweat. It handles like an e-bike but feels more like a sidewalk on wheels. The idea became a real transport option that's now popping up in cities across the world. Riders don't need cycling experience, just a desire to walk farther than usual. It might look strange, but it definitely turns heads.

Cancer scanner: A team of American high school students have created an app that could change lives. Using AI, their oral scan app spots potential mouth cancers from a simple smart-phone photo, offering an accessible tool in rural areas when dental care can be scarce. The app, originating in the state of Arkansas (U.S.), was designed to be quick, intuitive, and usable worldwide. Its ease of use could make early detection available to more people. The students entered the app in a national competition, and secured a \$50,000 (USD) grant for their school. Awards are exciting, but the team's real win is already clear: their work is raising awareness and drawing attention at medical conferences. A small app is creating a big ripple.

Hive revolution: In fields where blossoms no longer meet demand, a new feeding solution has given honey bee colonies a fresh chance. Developed to mimic the full spectrum of nutrients bees find in pollen, a bar-like supplement has shown promise in helping hives stay active through tough seasons. Trials revealed stronger colony growth and survival where natural sources fall short, especially during pollination of crops like blueberries. The formula includes a rare plant molecule thought to support larval health and adult vitality. Fed directly inside the hive, it reaches bees in all stages of life. Instead of relying on what's blooming, beekeepers might soon rely on this as a steady resource.

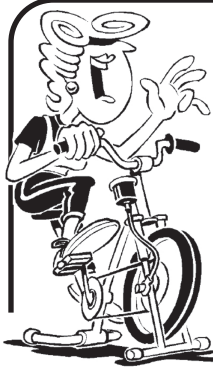

| 2 (15 ounce) cans black-eyed peas, drained | 1 (3 ounce) jar bacon bits |
| 1 bunch green onions, chopped | 1/4 cup sugar |
| 2 stalks celery, chopped | 1/4 cup red wine vinegar |
| 1 medium green bell pepper, chopped | 1/4 cup olive oil |
| 1 (2 ounce) jar diced pimientos, drained | 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar |
| | salt and pepper to taste |

1. In a large bowl, mix the black-eyed peas, green onions, celery, bell pepper, pimientos, and bacon bits.
2. In a separate bowl, mix the sugar, red wine vinegar, olive oil, balsamic vinegar, salt, and pepper. Toss with the salad. Cover and chill at least 3 hours before serving.
