## Everybody's Talking!

**Animal alternative:** A shimmering green parrot suddenly appears in the ring, followed by an elephant family thundering past an astonished crowd, but none of it is real. Germany's Roncalli Circus replaced live animals with holograms, using high-resolution projections and mesh screens to create vivid illusions. The idea emerged from the growing use of holographic performances in entertainment, where digital recreations often take center stage. Mounting concerns about animal welfare, along with the challenge of housing creatures while on tour, led the circus to explore this alternative. Instead of asking what is missing, this circus asks what is possible. Some guests leave smiling, unsure what was more magical: the circus or what it chose to leave behind.

**Sacred climb:** Mount Tai in Tai'an, China, is revered as a bridge between earth and sky, and has drawn pilgrims and poets for centuries. Though not among China's tallest peaks, the path to its summit demands spirit, winding more than 6,000 stone steps upward. Hikers can start at the Red Gate, passing incense-filled temples and ancient stone tables while climbing through forests. Many pause at midway stations or take the cable car, but the most determined can follow in the steps of emperors to reach the peak. Jade Emperor Peak rewards sunrise seekers with sweeping views, often shared with hundreds gathered at the top. Mount Tai's towering presence inspires the feeling that the world, from above, looks very small.

**Border puzzle:** In the town of Baarle, where Belgium and the Netherlands meet, the border isn't a straight line—it's a maze. Streets, houses, and even buildings are split between the two countries, with white crosses on the ground showing where one ends and the other begins. Some people sleep in one country and cook breakfast in the other. The confusion began long ago, when land was divided between noble families, and it took centuries to settle the details. Locals deal with mixed rules, double services, and two of almost everything. Visitors come to see the odd layout, but for those who live here, it's about working together and solving everyday problems across a dotted line.

**Laugh line:** A vintage pay phone with a twist is bringing back dial tones and punchlines in Washington, D.C. (U.S.). Instead of just making calls, this sidewalk fixture also tells knock-knock jokes, shares fun facts, and delivers cheerful thoughts, all triggered by the press of a button. Rewired and reimagined by a local teacher, the phone uses a small computer and home wi-fi to run its light-hearted programming and keep things fresh. Kids walking by often stop to giggle or to surprise their parents with an unexpected call. While smartphones dominate daily life, this throwback gadget offers a reminder that simple ideas can still connect people. It's not just nostalgia—it's community, with a dial tone.

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## Recipe of the Week

### Baked Pork Chops I

6 pork chops  
1 teaspoon garlic powder  
1 teaspoon seasoning salt  
2 egg, beaten  
1/4 cup all-purpose flour  
2 cups Italian-style seasoned bread crumbs  
4 tablespoons olive oil  
1 (10.75 ounce) can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
1/2 cup milk  
1/3 cup white wine

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).

2. Rinse pork chops, pat dry, and season with garlic powder and seasoning salt to taste.

Place the beaten eggs in a small bowl. Dredge the pork chops lightly in flour, dip in the egg, and coat liberally with bread crumbs.

3. Heat the oil in a medium skillet over medium-high heat. Fry the pork chops 5 minutes per side, or until the breading appears well browned. Transfer the chops to a 9x13 inch baking dish, and cover with foil.

4. Bake in the preheated oven for 1 hour. While baking, combine the cream of mushroom soup, milk and white wine in a medium bowl. After the pork chops have baked for an hour, cover them with the soup mixture. Replace foil, and bake for another 30 minutes.
